

## Remnants of the Past

It seems timely to be thinking of this subject, since I just passed a milestone birthday, although the pejorative, "Old Fossil", doesn't yet apply (I hope!). In any case, the term is redundant, since fossils are by definition old. Not just old—they're ancient evidence of the living animals and plants that once lived here. Fossils are the last vestige of life forms that existed in a world we can otherwise explore only in our imaginations. Once living organisms, their fragmentary remains offer clues about what this part of the world was like millennia ago.

Skeletons, shells, and more rarely, soft tissues of animals, and the roots, stems or trunks, leaves, and even individual grains or spores of plants have been preserved by being embedded in sedimentary layers, where, over time, they are gradually replaced by silicates, and calcium carbonate. Immense pressure on overlying layers of soil, rock or water caused the organisms buried below to be preserved in delicate, even microscopic, detail. These treasures from the past are hidden in layers of sedimentary sandstone, limestone, and shale, and within beds of peat that were later transformed to coal.

Fossils can be of several types: sometimes pieces or bits of he original material may survive, real bone, shell, or test (the casing of some invertebrates). In most cases, though, what's left is the mineralized structure of the creature or plant, or the hollow cast or mold of its body or trail, as with some marine worms, for example.

In our region there are two significant fossil rich areas.



Coral reefs were built some 425 million years ago in the Silurian period when the Great Lakes area was covered by a shallow tropical sea. The reef organisms were preserved in dolomite (magnesium-rich) limestone deposited on the sea floor. This limestone underlies the entire Chicago region. The Thornton quarry, which can be seen from I-80 or Thornton-Lansing Road, occupies one of the largest of these reefs, one particularly rich in fossils. Found there are fossils of the sedimentary reef-building organisms like corals Halysites and Favosites, calcareous algae, stromatoporids-lime secreting animals, brachiopods, and the trilobites Calymene and Bumastus. Brachiopods are bivalves that resemble clams but are not related. The three-lobed body trilobite is an abundant fossil, yet no members of its subclass survived extinction.

The other fossil rich region is the Fossil Forest area around Mason Creek near Braidwood in Will County extending through Grundy County and to the southwest, where the vast lowland forests flourished and died as the continental seas of the Pennsylvanian era 300 million years ago ebbed and flowed. The forest remains were compressed and hardened into coal deposits. Ironstone concretions found here can be lightly rapped on the edge with a rock hammer to crack open, and often reveal impressions of plant stems and leaves or the fossilized remains of animals such as the soft-bodied marine invertebrate, the Tully Monster, found nowhere else in the world.

Ancient plants in this fossil record show a very different flora from that of today. Huge ferns grew fifty feet high with six-foot fronds, but scale trees one hundred feet high dwarfed them. Scouring rushes and club mosses were also tree-size, unlike the small forms found here today. Condaites, early forbears of conifers, preceded the true gymnosperms like ginko and sequoia.

Fossils are the time-line of life on earth, and accessible wherever stone layers are exposed to view. In quarries, along streams or lakeshores, even in the gravel underfoot, these ancient recorders of earth's past await your discovery.





Inspired by Thorn Creek Nature Center **Prairie Chapel** is an original graphite drawing by Marikay Peter Witlock





#### **Premise Activities:**

-Village of Park Forest replaced the front door of the nature center, installed the Jim Marzuki Memorial Plaque in the Prairie Sampler, and reserved the Village Board Room for the Friends of Thorn Creek's Annual Meeting.-Tinley Park Girl Scouts cleaned all the shelves, unpacked all the materials, and set-up the toddler play space on the Nature Center balcony as a community service project.

-FPDWC contracted surveyors surveyed and erected new TCP boundary signs for the state land that recently was turned over to FPDWC. These new boundary signs will also be posted on the rest of the exterior boundaries of preserve.

-April led AmeriCorps Team in the preserve from Aug. 23- 27, Bob Hernandez assisted. The new segment of the Woodland Trail Loop was completed including 2 boardwalks, and 3 water diversion bars. Barricades were also constructed on each side of the defunct trail. Signposts were installed. Also, a boardwalk was installed at the wetland Overlook platform to cover soggy trail. April and Judy Mendelson planned and prepared for the project. Americorps is a grant through the Village of Park Forest. Friends of Thorn Creek woods purchased all the materials and supplies needed.

-Federal/State Agencies placed insect monitoring devices in preserve.
