



Winter Walks Offer Something Special

Most of us don't think about hiking in wintertime. But there are things to be gained from a winter walk in the woods that you can't find in the summer, spring or fall: views that are not obscured by leaves. In winter, the rise and fall of the landscape around us is completely open and visible. Steep rises in the ground, ravines and ridges—all are waiting to be seen in woods that we typically only visit in warmer weather.

Creeks, ponds, lakes and rivers shine and sparkle, calling to us from a distance. We can answer that call by hiking closer. But, if you don't have the time for an extended hike or like me - you find that ascending and descending trails are more challenging, you can still get the benefit of admiring their beauty from afar. The journey of each tree as it grows to maturity is also completely open to our view and contemplation. Did it grow straight up or did its boughs have to stretch out sideways to reach the sun's rays? Were branches twisted or lost because of storms or fierce wind gusts? Did other trees go down around it? If so, did they change the trees trajectory? Did drought slow its growth at some point on its journey? Did the tree have to twist and contort itself around a nearby tree that had already claimed the space near it? These, and other events, are visible in the shape, girth and height of every tree that we see. Each tree is the visible embodiment of its personal dance with nature and a portrayal of how it has received the gifts or met the challenges which that tree encountered as it matured. All of these struggles and triumphs are open to our contemplation in winter.

Trees are also a wonderful example of a universal part of life on this planet: the spiral. The next time you pour water down a drain, watch the direction it takes as gravity exerts its pull. Just as water swirls downward in a spiral, so do trees spiral *upward* as they grow. That growth proceeds at such a slow pace that it is essentially invisible to us. However, it can be made visible through the bark that encircles trees. You can see it best in the Burr Oak but it is there in every other tree, no matter how smooth the bark. Begin at the bottom and move up. Examine the bark of the oak as it climbs and encircles the tree. You can follow its path as it spirals around the tree, following/creating the direction of its growth as the great oak stretched up to the sky. The bark is the evidence of the direction of its growth and it is easier to see the spiral when it does not disappear into summer leaves. So, look, trace and admire!

Winter also serves up some unique opportunities for those of us who love seeing the birds and mammals that inhabit the woods. Some birds leave us for warmer climes in the winter. But others, like the tiny *Dark Eyed Juncos*, with their dark gray coloring and pinkish white bills, can only be seen here in the winter. They arrive every year to inhabit our woods and fields because, hard as it may be to believe, it's warmer in Northeastern Illinois than it is in their northern habitats. Look for Juncos on the ground where they search for the seeds, nuts and grains that help these insect eaters make it through the winter months. It is also much easier, after the trees and bushes have dropped their leaves, to spot our year round avian friends, from the colorful *Cardinals* and *Blue Jays* to the more subtly colored *Wrens*, *Mourning Doves and House Finches*. Will County's *Hairy*, *Downey* and *Red Bellied* woodpeckers are also easier to find as they climb the trees and make their presence known with their drumming and unique calls.

There are few better places than **Thorn Creek Woods** to take a winter hike. You can see the dramatic impact of water - in this case Thorn Creek - on the surrounding landscape. Thorn Creek Wood's deep ravine, carved out by the creek, and the curving path of the creek as it winds through the woods, are much more visible in the winter. Walk the longer path as it follows the ridge and look down into the ravine to see the creek below you. Or walk to the bridge and enjoy a close view of Thorn Creek as it moves towards you, flows under the bridge and out the other side to continue its journey through the woods. Take the boardwalk to Owl Lake where you may be lucky enough to see some deer keeping a watchful eye on you without the leaves to give them cover in the daytime. Walk quietly and you may also spot geese or other waterfowl floating serenely on the lake when you arrive.

I strongly encourage you to keep an eye on the weather, look for a sunny day and bundle up to take advantage of the unusual and special views that winter can offer.



Alice Hanes, from Crete, died on February 9, 2023, at age 91. She was predeceased by her husband Joe, and grandson Mark Barnes and is survived by her 6 loving children, 17 cherished grandchildren, 10 great grandchildren and many nephews and nieces.

Alice's greatest joys were gatherings with family and friends, hosting many dinners and reunions, including friends from her YMCA years. As a swimmer all her life, she was fiercely competitive, broke records and won multiple medals in the National Senior Games and Illinois Masters Swimming Association from her 60s to 80s!

She was a dedicated teacher and taught children from preschool to high school, including years of swimming lessons. An avid motorcyclist with her husband Joe, she drove all over the US and Europe. She loved to work and work hard, from digging foundations to managing reg-

istration at BMW rallies and becoming President of the Chicago Region BMW Motorcycle Association. Along with raising her family, building a home from the ground up, driving a school bus, baking bread for a co-op, and donating gallons of blood, she still found time to volunteer as a long time member of the Unitarian Church and Thorn Creek Nature Preserve. She also managed to become the first person in her family to complete a college degree at GSU, and then worked at the University in Registration until she retired. She was dearly loved by all and admired for her generosity of time and spirit.

Her other interests were cooking, baking bread, decorating cakes, gardening, recycling, bird watching and scrapbooking.

She lived wholeheartedly with an almost photographic memory.

-Village of Park Forest replaced the front porch flooring and railings, and the overhang of the Nature Center.

Also, they removed the garbage can stand, and cement drinking fountain and signpost.

-FPDWC plows and sands parking lot; mowed and cleared the Wetland Overlook Trail, Owl Lake Loop Trail and the Owl Lake Trail, including pine tunnel, mowed a walking path at Camp Pompeii for fall and winter programs, regularly mows and trims Nature Center yard, collected landscape waste and old lumber, removed limbs from preserve trails, installed new cable gate at entrance to old Camp Pompeii, mowed farm meadows and road.



-April, Bob and other volunteers and helpers from FPDWC are replacing the old preserve boundary signs with the new ones- an ongoing project.

-New Lenox Troop 44, Eagle Scout Billy Kozicki, installed two new 24' boardwalks along north side of Woodland Trail.



--April led **AmeriCorps** Team in the preserve in August, Bob Hernandez assisted. The Team painted the entrance sign and the bike rack, cleared brush around the parking lot, driveway, and prairie sampler, painted the posts and installed 3 signposts, removed the 2 old fences and installed 2 new fences, spread and compacted gravel on the walkway and behind nature center, installed new borders on butterfly garden and added topsoil, installed wooden bumpers stops in the parking lot and hauled all waste to the road for collection.

As part of AmeriCorps, the Village of Park Forest removed the old railroad ties from the parking lot edges, drilled the fence posts holes for the new parking lot fence and assisted with the installation, graded and leveled the surface of the parking lot, created and installed wooden bumper stops for the parking lot, and delivered 3 loads of gravel and provided a compactor for the walkway upgrade.

Americorps is a grant through the Village of Park Forest. Friends of Thorn Creek Woods purchased all the materials and supplies needed.
